South Wirral High School is a Co-educational, Comprehensive day school for students aged 11-18 years with 1041 students, 64 teachers and 44 support staff.





Every child matters at our high school and we are aspirational in everything we do. We want your child to be a successful leader, be organised, show resilience and initiative, which means they become outstanding characters and the best version of themselves. There are lots of exciting opportunities before they join us in September, including virtual activities on Google Classroom, the Welcome Day on Wednesday 3rd July and I look forward to visiting many of them at their primary schools too.

WELCOME TO THE SOUTH WIRRAL FAMILY

The time of transition from primary to secondary can cause anxieties to both children and parents. It is a very exciting time but having been the eldest in primary to suddenly the youngest in secondary can be quite daunting.

During the summer in the lead up to starting, some children feel quite nervous but after the Welcome Evening and Welcome Day in July, your child will be reassured that the school is a caring community and both staff and students are here to help and support them. Most importantly all of our students have been in that exact position themselves so know how apprehensive your child will be feeling.



THE FIRST DAY

There are always anxieties about the very first day, but all your child needs to do is get themselves to the school and bring the equipment listed on Page 20, and they will be guided every step of the way. Please reassure your son/daughter that everyone knows they are new to the school and no-one will expect them to know how everything works straight away.

On the first day a good deal of time is spent going through systems and procedures with the tutor before regular lessons start. All of the older students will start a day later than Year 7, to give the newcomers a chance to acclimatise to the school.

Even the journey to school is new and can be different as your child may be catching a bus/ train for the first time, in which case it may be an idea to run through the process with them the week before school starts to help curtail their anxieties. Page 3

SETTLING IN

Often the biggest concern is getting lost and we know parents are often anxious as to how their child will manage in such a large school as South Wirral. However - from years of experience - year 7 students always get their bearings very quickly.

Part of the Welcome Day focusses on helping students find their way around the school, from the dining hall to the Sports Hall and everything in between. Inevitably students do get lost during the first few days, but all staff are strategically positioned outside classrooms to guide them to the right classroom and there are always students more than willing to help new starters settle in.

The timetable is adapted slightly for the first few days to allow year 7 students to go into lunch early so they are familiar with the systems and can be given individual support.

OUR YEAR GROUP SYSTEM

The Head of Year and Assistant Head of Year will be your child's first port of call and are the most caring, helpful and supportive members of staff you could wish to meet. Prior to your son/daughters arrival at South Wirral there will have been a great deal of communication between ourselves and your child's primary. Staff from South Wirral will have visited primary schools to talk with their teacher to discuss academic progress and inform us of anything they feel we need to know about your child. If however your child has a personal issue you feel we should be aware of please inform their Head of Year.

'Moving on Up' from primary school to South Wirral is a big step but an exciting step and within a week both you and your child will wonder what all those anxieties were all about. We are a family; a community built around an extremely successful system. Every child matters and helping, supporting and caring is a significant part of our school ethos.





LESSONS! SO MANY DIFFERENT SUBJECTS, SO MANY DIFFERENT TEACHERS!

It is likely your child will need a bit of support in adjusting to the fact they will now have over 12 different lessons with 12 different teachers in 12 different places! However, your child will very quickly adapt and enjoy the variety of working with different subject teachers. Your child will be issued with a timetable and given guidance and support by all staff and fellow students but please can you ensure each night your child has packed their bag and has their planner, right equipment & kit for the following day. A limited number of student lockers are also available from the front office for a one off fee of £20 for the duration of their time at school. £5 is refunded on return of the key.

DAY TO DAY PROCEDURES

We ask that if you need to make contact with your child during the school day that you do so via the school office and not phone them directly. If you know your child is not going to be in school for medical reasons please contact the school office.

School will keep you up to date on a host of issues and you will find all the information you need on Arbor - our parent portal where parents can access their individual child's timetable, achievement points, progress grades, attendance etc. There is further information on the school website. If you are concerned that communications are not reaching you, let your child's Head of Year or Tutor know.

MONITORING ACADEMIC PROGRESS

Our aim is to raise achievement by making it easy for students and parents to see how well your child is doing, to recognise achievement and to show where they needs to improve. In addition student progress is monitored closely by the Head of Year and the Senior Leadership Team so that intervention and support can be targeted.

Some assessments are also on display for students and parents to view on our Arbor portal. The printed reports are a snapshot of the student's assessments at the time they were printed, but the display on Arbor is "live". That is, whenever a teacher changes a grade for example, if a student produces a higher standard of work, the display on Arbor will update every night.

REPORTING PROGRESS

Our students are assessed on their core knowledge in each subject across the year, this is reported home 3 times each year, we call them Assessment Points or APs. When the student has sat their AP assessment teachers will mark and track their progress, this is reported home. When the report card is sent home you will see the percentage mark that they achieved and what the average percentage for the year group was. In addition, you may have some next steps advice for improvement in certain areas.

Staff will use this data to respond to the needs of students on an individual level or class level, lessons may be tweaked to ensure knowledge gaps are filled, seating plans may change so that students are supported in a different way in the class room, they may even get some intervention during the school day to boost their progress.

NEXT STEPS ADVICE

Being on or above target deserves praise. Students who are underachieving will need encouragement and support from parents and subject teachers. This may be all that is needed, but if the problem affects a number of subjects, the Head of Year will also be involved in intervention and support and will contact parents if concerns are serious. Parents with concerns should contact the Head of Year. We operate an open door policy to parents, making a commitment to respond to concerns at any time.

• In addition to the reporting of assessments, parents will also receive a detailed printed report at parents evenings and have 24/7 access to live data through Arbor.

• Parents evenings enable detailed discussion of student progress. At any stage in the year, if parents have a concern, they should contact the Head of Year.



LORIC PLEDGES

As well as providing an extensive array of courses and learning opportunities within the



academic curriculum, we want all our students to be confident, independent, self-disciplined, participators, performers, communicators, creators and culturally educated.

Providing our students with an enriched curriculum and broad extra-curricular programme of activities, to fully equip them with the skills necessary to be active and successful members of the wider community, is at the heart of our school ethos.

To ensure students receive high-quality enrichment activities and cultural experiences throughout their seven years at South Wirral through key stage 3 to key stage 5, we have written our own LORIC pledges which have been created to ensure all students have access to an all-embracing range of learning experiences outside of the classroom.

Each pledge represents a LORIC standard which signifies **Leadership, Organisation, Resilience, Initiative & Character.**

Over each key stage, students will be expected to complete at least 5 elements of each LORIC standard. A minimum of 25 pledges will be achieved at each key stage.

The LORIC pledges will form part of the registration activity once a week and tutors will be responsible for recording the accomplishment of each pledge. This will be recorded on Arbor and achievement of these pledges will be celebrated during assemblies, led by an Assistant Head of Year.

Evidence of each pledge achieved will also be recorded and documented in a student progress folder.

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HOME LEARNING

• At South Wirral High School we consider the completion of home learning an essential part of learning that will help all students to embed and enhance their learning from the classroom. It enables students to develop the skills, confidence and motivation needed to study effectively on their own.

• In years 7, 8 and 9 home learning tasks encourage students to practise important skills that are required for their work in school. This then helps students progress more rapidly and so in turn supports a positive and interested approach to school work.

• Home learning helps parents and carers to be involved in students' learning and keeps them informed about the work students are doing.

HOW CAN PARENTS AND

Parents and carers can give valuable help in the following ways:-

• provide a reasonably peaceful, suitable place in which students can do their homework

• make it clear that homework is valued, and support the school in explaining how it can help students make progress

• regularly encourage students to complete homework on time and to the best of their ability

praise students when homework is completed

• support their child's work when they work from the homework booklets produced in lower school.

• support school sanctions that make sure all students take homework very seriously; for example a detention if homework is late or not done

• contact school if there appears to be too little or too much homework provided.

THE SCHOOL LIBRARY

The library is committed to supporting the school's mission as a caring community of learning, by providing easy and convenient access to the entire library services one would expect. We offer a pleasant, user-friendly environment that is conducive to private study and research.

Students are welcome to read daily newspapers and magazines, and computers are available for independent study.

We have recruited several pupil librarians who are trained to perform many of the library tasks such as issuing and returning books on our computer system. The library is open from 8:15am until 4pm, including throughout break time and most of the lunchtime session.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

When we survey our students, they talk about their love of subjects in school. So in addition to our enjoyment of English, Maths and Science, the most popular subjects are History, Geography, Languages, the Arts subjects, PE and Technology.

Each week there are over sixty clubs available to students, so they can extend their learning and enjoy activities with students who also love Music, Sports, Cookery, Reading and Computer Coding.

HOME-SCHOOL COMMUNICATIONS

E-LEARNING

At South Wirral High School we fully embrace the use of technology within our curriculum.

The school has adopted G-Suite, which gives students access to Google Classroom, student email along with a range of web apps that support their learning in school and at home. Students can see lists of online homework and complete it at anytime, anywhere on any device. The use of G-Suite allows learning to continue outside of the classroom. ARBOR

Our parent communications portal it called Arbor. Parents receive emails of all letters that are sent out along with other school notices - direct to your email account.

The portal allows you to easily access up to date information about your child/children at South Wirral High School in one place. The information you can access includes attendance, assessments, timetable and more.

There is a free Arbor App you can download for Android or Apple devices. This app allows you to access all the information on a tablet or smartphone plus receive messages from school. We would encourage parents to download the app as this will enable us to send messages to you in the future.

Logins for the portal are emailed out at the beginning of the year.





CARE, GUIDANCE AND SUPPORT

HEAD OF YEAR

The Head of Year monitors the student's whole educational experience, overseeing the welfare of students in their care, ensuring that the individual needs of students are met.

The Head of Year morally, spiritually, socially and culturally helps to educate the students in their care, throughout their time at South Wirral.

The Head of Year, the Assistant Head of Year and the Tutors are the link between home and school. Parents of Year 7 students are invited into school to meet "Leaders and governors have an ambitious vision for the school. They have created a wellconsidered academic curriculum.

pastoral staff a short time after the start of the school year and they act in partnership to ensure that students are supported and encouraged at each stage of their development.

Parents are warmly welcomed to the school to meet the Head of Year to discuss any matter or review any difficulties or concerns that their children may be experiencing. It is important to us and your child that parents and Head of Year work in partnership to help raise achievement and promote development.

CONDUCT FOR LEARNING

At South Wirral we strongly feel that all students are entitled to come to school safely, happily and free from any fear of bullying. Students are encouraged not to "suffer in silence" but to inform someone if they are being bullied - their Head of Year, another teacher, a parent or a friend.

Citizenship lessons and assemblies reinforce the fact that bullying will not be tolerated at South Wirral and will be dealt with severely.

A Lunchtime Club in the Learning Base is available for students at lunchtime who want a quiet room.

The School Anti-Bullying Policy is available for inspection on our website, and from the school office.

STUDENT SERVICES

We have consolidated a number of pastoral services into one location, named 'Student Services'. Located immediately to the left of the main student entrance, here you can find your Assistant Head of Year.

Student Services is our one-stop-shop for students who need any help or support. From buying stationary to support with learning and any other school issues.







STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

We have high expectations of all our students whatever their ability.

From the beginning of their time with us, careful attention is given to identifying and assessing special educational needs in accordance with the Code of Practice.

The Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator works closely with primary schools to ensure continuity of support for children who have particular learning difficulties which have already been identified at Key Stage 1 & 2. Great importance is attached to helping those with difficulties and specialist help is available for those students with Special Needs. Programmes are set up for students with Special Needs targeting their individual problems.

The department has a team of Teaching Support Assistants. This enables us to target and support those students identified as having Special Educational Needs more effectively, assisting them both in class and in small workshops to achieve their full potential.



In order to ensure maximum progress and support inclusion, we work in close contact with the following agencies:

In accordance with our Equal Opportunities policy, any pupil suffering from a physical disability would be given all assistance and opportunity within the school.

Students with Special Educational needs are treated at all times with sensitivity and respect. A climate of warmth and support is fostered to provide the best possible base from which self-confidence and self-esteem can grow. Full involvement with Head of Year and close liaison with parents provides a clear up to date picture of progress, which is monitored, recorded and reviewed regularly.

SAFEGUARDING

Our school recognises our moral and statutory responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of pupils. We endeavour to provide a safe and welcoming environment where children are respected and valued. We will be alert to signs of abuse and neglect, and will follow our procedures to ensure that children receive effective support and protection.

From time to time the school receives information from a variety of sources (children, parents or other adults) concerned with the protection of individual children. This information will always be dealt with as confidentially as possible and disseminated to appropriate personnel only. "The school's work to promote pupils' personal development and welfare is good. Leaders have recently overhauled the school's pastoral systems and this has significantly improved the level of care pupils receive. Staff know pupils well."

Parents do need to be aware that whilst we will deal with such information with sensitivity, there are legal

responsibilities laid upon the school to report actual allegations to Social Care or the Police and there are procedures we are expected to follow if suspicions are passed onto us. All of us, as adults, have to accept that it is the protection of the child who may be at some kind of risk which is most important.

BEHAVIOUR STUDENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The working relationship between staff and students is very positive and is fully supported by the Pastoral system. If students fail to adhere to our Code of Conduct they may be referred to their Head of Year, who will deal with the concerns.

If a student is not achieving a high enough standard of work or behaviour, a range of strategies may be used. These could include extra work, contacting parents, an instant short detention or a longer detention after school. You will be informed by letter of incidents of poor behaviour. These letters are counted and form the core of our behaviour system.

If there are serious concerns, students may be placed on Report. Parents will be informed and asked to sign the Report daily to show they are aware of the student's behaviour or work status. If the problem persists, other strategies may be employed such as the student being placed in the 'Internal Exclusion Unit'. The full range of available sanctions do not have to be used very often because the vast majority of our students are well behaved and hard-working members of their year group, School and community.

ATTENDANCE STUDENT ABSENCES

The law requires that children attend school regularly and punctually every day, unless written permission has been given for absence.

If you know your child is going to be late or absent, a telephone call is required to the school office on the first morning of absence, and on every subsequent morning of absence.

We ask parents to call school as early as possible so we can immediately account for a students non-arrival, failure to do so will cause unnecessary concern over your child's whereabouts. It will also ensure that you are not contacted unnecessarily by phone during the course of the day. We operate a first day absence telephone call procedure in order to promote good attendance and develop the partnership between parents and school.

Attendance is monitored by school and the Education Social Worker who will investigate unexplained absences. We expect every child to have outstanding attendance and celebrate the resilience shown by students who attend even in challenging circumstances.

FAMILY HOLIDAY

Holidays are not allowed to be taken during term time in line with the Government guidelines. In exceptional circumstances parents may apply to the Headteacher in writing explaining the situation and this will be considered.

In line with local and national policy, parents taking their children out of school during term time for holidays can be issued with a fixed penalty notice.

Holidays taken without advance permission being granted will be marked as unauthorised.

PRACTICAL INFORMATION

UNIFORM

- Black blazer with SWHS badge.
- Long or short sleeve white shirt, must be tucked in and done up to the collar.
- School tie with House colours available from Student Services.
- Black school trousers, Castle tartan kilt skirt or black pinafore dress.
- Skirts must be knee length pleated or A line. No tube skirts.
- Plain black belt with plain, non-branded buckle.
- Plain black, grey or white socks or tights.
- Polishable black school shoes; either flat or with a heel not exceeding 5cm. No ankle boots.
- Sports trainers may only be worn for PE lessons or for games activities at lunchtime only.

JEWELLERY / MAKE-UP

- Jewellery should not be worn in school. An inexpensive watch and one small stud in each ear are acceptable.
- Other earrings, nose rings/studs, tongue studs, eye-brow studs or any visible body piercings are unacceptable.
- Clear nail varnish only is acceptable.
- False / acrylic / gel nails are not permitted.
- No false eyelashes of any description are permitted.
- Students in Years 7, 8 and 9 may not wear make-up. Make-up worn by students in Year 10 and 11 must be discreet and business like.

HAIRSTYLES

- Hair cuts and styles must be smart and business like, and not covering the face or eyes.
- Discreet hair accessories should be in the school colours of black, red or white.
- No shaving all or part of the head.
- No lurid, unnatural or extreme colouring.
- No tramlines.

FREE SCHOOL UNIFORM

Wirral FUSS offer free uniform to anybody who needs it, without judgement of family circumstances Wirral FUSS supply FREE school uniform & PE kit used by the 22 secondary schools on the Wirral and around 30 of the 100 primary schools.

All uniforms are in good or new condition, and their 'hubs' have regular opening times when you try items on or swap your current outgrown uniform for larger items. Alternatively you can make an appointment with their volunteer staff

OTHER EQUIPMENT

Students should organise themselves for school and be responsible for bringing the necessary books and equipment to lessons.

The following items are essential and should be brought on a daily basis.

- Calculator
- A protractor, a pair of compasses
- A strong bag to carry homework, equipment and P.E. Kit.
- Planner

We are committed to ensuring every student has the correct uniform and equipment to ensure they can make the very best progress, every single day. Students and their families who would like to discuss financial support available should contact their child's Head of Year.



SCHOOL MEALS

Our on site meals service provides a wide and nutritious daily menu of hot food and sandwiches. In addition a dining hall is set aside for those students who wish to bring packed lunches.

We operate a cafeteria system and students pay only for those items which they select. There is a substantial choice of dishes.

All Year 7 - 11 students stay for lunch and must remain on school premises for the whole of the lunch period.

The LEA offers assistance over the cost of uniform, school meals and maintenance in the Sixth Form.


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

TRANSPORT LINKS

South Wirral High School is situated a short walk from two train stations on the Birkenhead-Chester/Ellesmere Port line (Bromborough and Eastham Rake), and is well served by local bus services.
